Pope Francis Announces Extraordinary Jubilee Year: Mercy! Mercy! Mercy!

On Divine Mercy Sunday, traditionally

the Second Sunday of Easter, Pope Francis formally announced an extraordinary Jubilee to begin later this year. He noted that this Jubilee will have as a theme a Holy Year of Mercy, and will look to Jesus' words to his disciples for inspiration, "Be merciful as your Father is merciful."

"I am convinced that the whole Church will be able to find in this Jubilee the joy of rediscovering and mak-

ing fruitful the mercy of God, with which we are called to give consolation to every man and every woman of our time," Francis said, and entrusted the Holy Year to Mary, Mother of Mercy.

The Jubilee will open on December 8, 2015, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, and will close on November 20, 2016 with the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. A Jubilee Year, also called a Holy Year, is an occasion for extraordinary celebrations, rituals and learning throughout the universal Church. The major basilicas of the city of Rome have doors designated as Holy Year doors unsealed and opened only for these extraordinary observances. This ritual is to symbolize an "extraordinary path" toward salvation

during the time of Jubilee.

If one could point to the strongest indication of continuity between the papacies of Pope St. John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI, and Pope Francis, it is their focus on the gift of God's mercy. It was, after all, St. John Paul II who identified the Second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday. All three have striven to see a reemergence of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the sacrament of mercy, in the life of the Church and of the faithful. Participation in this sacrament has fallen dramatically in recent decades.

That this Jubilee of Mercy should follow the conclusion of two Synods on the family is also a powerful witness. Where in one's life do most of us experience or need to experience mercy and reconciliation more than within the family? It is those hurts that cut deepest, those wounds hardest to heal. Can the Church in this Holy Year set in motion reflection and action that might bring healing?

Likewise our world is seemingly on the edge of disaster with widespread violence and terrorism. Millions of people are refugees today, forced from land and home, by hatred and fear. Can the Church model before the world a manner to effect healing and mercy?

In the months to come our diocese will explore how to bring the Jubilee Year to our prayer and worship and action. Certainly core to every diocese's observance will be renewed catechesis on the Sacrament of Reconciliation and invitation to welcome home those who have left the fold of the Church.

Pope Francis, in his first days as Bishop of Rome, addressed the thousands in St. Peter's Square when he said, "Mercy is the best thing we can feel: it changes the world. A little mercy makes the world less cold and more just. We need to understand properly this mercy of God, this merciful Father who is so patient."

So now the Church universal and the local Church will plan our Jubilee of Mercy. Perhaps each individual should also plan a personal Jubilee. Might there be someone to whom we need to offer mercy? Might there be someone from whom we should seek mercy?

Mercy! Mercy! Mercy!

4 May, 2015 The Passionist Nuns - Cloistered on Calvary

As the Church continues to celebrate this Year for Consecrated Life, the Passionist Nuns of Whitesville, KY, would like to share with you another aspect of our life. As you may know, we are "cloistered contemplative nuns." To be cloistered means that normally we remain within our monastery's enclosure or "cloister." By fostering an environment of peaceful silence within a close-knit Christian community, the cloister enables us to live our contemplative vocation, dedicating our lives to the work of prayer. Our hiddenness helps to free us from much of the noise and distractions which tear so many people away from prayer in our modern world.

As Passionist Nuns, we dwell in the "spiritual cloister" of Calvary. We live our lives at the foot of the Cross and find here not only our path to contemplative union with God, but also the means of profound interaction with our brothers and sisters on earth. Our very union with the Redeemer spurs us to share in His work of drawing all people to Himself, in practical as well as mystical ways. Closely joined to our contemplative prayer is a life of intercession for the needs of the world; indeed, our constitutions enjoin them "to know the life of the Church and of society" in which we live, in order to hold in prayer all its varied needs. Nuns keep abreast of the world through a variety of different media and through good and reliable contacts, and can often be better informed about current events and key issues than the average American citizen!

From our very beginnings Passionist Nuns have sought to welcome others to

the fountainhead of God's mercy, flowing from the wounds of Christ Crucified. We are called to be witnesses to this merciful love not only by our prayerful presence but also by our words — regularly written and spoken to family, friends, and visitors — and by our deeds. Many monasteries, including our own, have guest-houses where others are invited to spend time at the foot of the Cross with the nuns, whose privilege and responsibility it is to minister to these retreatants. Thus the clear waters of the "sealed fountain" of Passionist monastic life (cf. Song of Songs 4:12), protected as they are by the restrictions of the cloister, are able to reach and to refresh far more souls than merely those of the nuns who dwell there.

The vocation to be a "dove in the clefts of the rock," the open side of Jesus, is certainly not restricted to any particular sort of personality or skill-set! Like all cloistered nuns, Passionists are as varied and variously gifted as any natural extended family. One finds among the brides of the Crucified extroverts and introverts, doctorates and high-school diplomas, construction workers and accountants and artists (and everything in between). The unique personalities and gifts of each sister simply indicate how the Lord wills to bless the community with a sister's strengths and how the other sisters can support her in her weaknesses. Thus they enable the whole community to live out more fully the life to which they are all called! United by their love of Him who calls them into the intimacy of His love, the nuns rejoice to offer their daily lives as an oblation for the sake of God and His whole world.

Prior to this calling, Sr. Fran taught elementary school children, served in South America and California missions, ran a prayer house and directed charismatic renewal.



Hope In The Future


Sisters of CHARITY OF NAZARETH By Sister Nancy Gerth, SCN





Diocese Response to Sexual Abuse

The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People provides a comprehensive framework for addressing allegations of sexual abuse and for creating safe environments in parishes and schools, and it directs all sexual abuse policies and procedures in the Diocese of Owensboro. In 2013, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops audited our diocese and as was determined in each previous audit, our diocese was found to be fully compliant with all elements of the Charter.

Prevention/Education

1,819 employees and volunteers participated in safe environment training during the past fiscal year. (7/1/2013 - 6/30/2014)

Sexual Abuse Review Board

The Review Board reviews past and present cases and monitors the implementation of our sexual abuse policies.

Cooperation with Civil Authorities

Any report or suspicion of child abuse is reported immediately to civil authorities, and the Diocese cooperates fully with any investigation.




Operating Income



- Parish assessments of \$2.7 million represent a key income source of the Diocese. The Christian faithful of western Kentucky are obliged to assist with the needs of the Church so that the Church has what is necessary for divine worship, for the works of the apostolate and of charity, and for the decent support of ministers (Canon 222).
- The Disciple's Response Fund is an annual appeal that invites donations from the faithful to provide support to the Church for various programs and ministries provided by the Diocese. The total of \$0.4 million is included in the contributions, bequests and grants portion of the operating income.
- Investment income of \$5.6 million net of fees includes interest and dividends earned and reinvested into the Diocese of Owensboro's investment portfolio.
- Donations, grants and bequests of \$2.5 million include unrestricted and restricted gifts to the Diocese from generous benefactors.
- Other income of \$0.2 million includes interest earned on loans to parishes and other miscellaneous income.

Operating Expenses



Diocesan program expenses of \$13.9 million for the various services, activities, and ministries include the following:

- Catholic Schools Office Oversees the development of the instructors and academics throughout our seventeen Catholic schools in the Diocese. \$0.3 million
- Campus Ministry Supports the campus ministries at Brescia University, our only Catholic university in the Diocese as well as Murray State University and Western Kentucky University. \$0.2 million
- Communications Supports the printing and distribution of the Western Kentucky Catholic newspaper along with television ministry. \$0.25 million
- The Worship Office serves the diocesan community through liturgical education and training of Catholic lay leaders. \$0.21 million
- The Office of Hispanic Ministry works to identify and meet the pastoral needs for our Hispanic community within our Catholic community. \$0.4 million

- The Tribunal Office works to resolve issues of justice, primarily related to marriage according to the teachings of the Roman Catholic Church. \$0.24 million
- The Vocation Office facilitates and coordinates the development and formation of those called to priesthood and religious life. \$0.56 million
- The Religious Education Office provides resources, spiritual formation for DREs located in our parishes and schools throughout the diocese. \$0.1 million
- The Diocese, through program services, supports the Catholic Schools Food Service program and Bishop Soenneker Personal Care Home. \$1.0 million
- Retired Priests and Other Clergy expenses are primarily the annual cost of priest pensions. As of June 30, 2014, the Diocese had 13 retired priests receiving a pension. \$0.5 million
- Seminarian education expenses totaled \$0.6 million. For the fall 2014 semester, the Diocese had 12 seminarians in formation for the priesthood. Two seminarians were ordained into the priesthood in May 2014.
- Grants made to Catholic organizations. \$1.0 million



Responding to Today's Need and Tomorrow's Vision Capital Campaign



The campaign ended in December of 2014. As you can see from the graphs to date, we have raised \$5,735,945. Thanks to each of you who made this possible.







Independent Auditors' Report

Sisters of St. Francis of Penance and Charity, Tiffin, Ohio



The plight of the orphan after the Civil War burned in the heart of a German immigrant priest, Rev Joseph Bihn, pastor of St. Joseph Church, Tiffin, Ohio. Hearing Christ's words, "Whatever you do to one of the least of these, you do to me" (Matthew 25:40); he was determined to find care for destitute children and elders left without family support.

Our humble beginnings began in 1867 when Fr. Bihn purchased fifty-eight acres of land southeast of Tiffin. One Sunday morning he told his parishioners of his desire and asked for help. A widow, Elizabeth (Greiveldinger) Schaefer, also an immigrant responded. Selling her farm, she gave the income and entire savings to this new endeavor. On March 1 1868, Elizabeth, her two young daughters Mary Ann and Josephine (later Sister Bonaventure and Sister Alacoque), her aging father, a brick maker, and an orphan boy, whom she was helping to rear, moved to the new property.

Intending to find a group of Sisters to care for the residents of the Home, Father Bihn was advised to found his own community of Sisters. The Most Reverend Amadeus Rappe, Bishop of Cleveland, granted permission and his heartfelt blessing. Father Bihn told Elizabeth Schaefer of the Bishop's blessing and asked her to consider starting a community of Sisters. She responded affirmatively, saying in later years, "He asked me only once."

On the feast of the Sacred Heart, June 4, 1869, the community of the Sisters of St. Francis of Penance and Charity was formed. Elizabeth Schaefer (Mother Francis) and her sister-in-law, Mary Schaefer, professed their vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. Elizabeth's daughter, Mary Ann, and Cunnigunda Schmidt, also from St. Joseph's parish, became the first novices as Sisters of St. Francis. (Both Father Bihn and Elizabeth were Secular Franciscans). When other women witnessed the love and dedication of the early members, they too were attracted to join this young community.

The growing family required housing. Formed with clay found on the farm, bricks were fired on site and construction

begun. Within ten years the buildings expanded to include additional living space and a chapel. The family numbered 215 persons.

Sister Death called both co-founders home in 1893. The institution was shaken and struggled for the right to exist. Mother Clara Bork guided the community from 1894-1910 through the dark years of sorrow, trial and difficulty.

The spirit of the founders led the Sisters to expand their services in Ohio and Illinois; in founding hospitals in Lorain, Ohio and in Minot, North Dakota, and in ministry at the Pontifical College Josephinum (then a seminary and orphan home for boys).

Upon the formation of the Diocese of Toledo in1910, Bishop Joseph Schrembs recalled all the Sisters serving beyond its boundaries. With saddened, yet faithful hearts, the sisters responded. In1916, the congregation was erected as a diocesan institute under the patronage of Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary.

Within the Toledo Diocese the Sisters continued their founding ministry and expanded their efforts to schools in rural parishes, to care of pilgrims at the Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation in Carey, and later to health care in Linton, North Dakota and in Paducah, Kentucky.

In 1959 we were invited to the Diocese of Owensboro to manage and staff the then Riverside Hospital (today Lourdes) in Paducah, Kentucky. Our ministry expanded in the diocese when our Sisters served in elementary and high school education, pastoral ministry, child care and health care.

The Sisters responded to the call of Pope John XXIII to send Sisters to Latin America. They began the now forty plus years of ministry in Chiapas, Mexico. A mission in Cuernavaca is serving poor children with the assistance with a growing numbers of Associates. The Sisters have entered the Sanctuary Movement, formed a Companion Community with the Hermanas de Santa Clara, in Central America, and continue to serve in Hispanic ministry in the United States. The first candidate from Mexico was received in 2009 and professed first yows In 2013. The Sisters of St. Francis continue to listen to the call of Vatican Council II responding faithfully, excitedly and oftentimes painfully.

They care for creation by looking



for ways to reuse, recycle and conserve. They have established the Franciscan Earth Literacy Center and Seeds of


Hope Farm, have placed more than 325 acres of farm land in a conservancy and developed a passive solar straw bale educational residence.

Following the call to serve among people who are often voiceless, the call of biblical justice focuses a comprehensive thrust toward peace and justice in both the self-identity and the ministry of the Tiffin Franciscans.

Amidst the realities of aging, diminishment, and downsizing "God is our Refuge and our Strength" holds firm as God uses and refashions broken vessels, keeping our hearts ablaze with renewed prayer, hope and courage. For almost 150 years, we have been blessed, challenged and gifted to respond to God's call of giving witness to the Gospel passage, "Whatever you do to one of the least of these, you do to me". 



Bishop William Medley Visits Catholic Schools

Senior Conversations

Special To The Western Kentucky Catholic

What a unique and unusual privilege it is to be invited to a conversation with Bishop Medley. The blessed recipients are the senior class in each of our Catholic high schools in the Diocese of Owensboro. Bishop Medley began this tradition five years ago immediately after being installed as our Bishop. Every year during the second semester of school he schedules about a 90 minute time period to talk openly with the students in each of the three senior classes.

Bishop Medley opens the conversation with an explanation about why he has made the time to meet with seniors. He talks to them about the incredible gift they have received in attending Catholic schools. The Bishop then asks them to carry their faith to all of the places to which they will travel after graduation: college campuses, jobs and military. It is at this time that he shares the beauty of being called to the vocations of priesthood and religious life and encourages the seniors to pray about the possibility. He talks with them the importance of practicing their faith and reminds them about Newman Centers on campuses being centers designed specifically for college students faith and sacramental needs.

Bishop Medley then communicates to the senior class that he is open to any question about the faith, priesthood, religious life, or the Catholic Church. Many of the issues that are impacting the Catholic Church at this time arise. The

Bishop uses these opportunities to be honest and transparent about these issues and teaches the Truth about our Catholic faith. The students respond and react with more openness and trust with their questions. What a beautiful opportunity our Bishop provides for our seniors just months prior to leaving their Catholic schools, parishes and homes.

We are deeply grateful to our God and our Catholic Church for sending Bishop Medley to serve our Diocese of Owensboro in spiritually guiding and teaching us. A true Shepherd he most certainly is!

Special To The Western Kentucky Catholic

Bishop Medley has been faithful about visiting each one of the 17 Diocese of Owensboro Catholic Schools annually to celebrate Mass with the entire student body and visit classrooms after the Mass. His commitment is so strong that he continues to visit despite dealing with his mother's failing health and the loss of his nephew. He is a living example of what the Catholic Church has called him to do, preach the Gospel to all those he has been called to shepherd.

Bishop Medley tailors his interactions with students based upon the age level of the classes he is visiting. He greets each class upon entry into the classroom. With the older students he asks the class if they have any questions about the Catholic Church, Bishops, Priests, religious or our Catholic faith. He does a wonderful job of tailoring his answers to the age range of the child answering. Most of the questions are about a Bishop's life, responsibilities, favorite saints and apparel worn. As the age of the students he addresses increases the questions reflect the student's interest in and desire to understand more about the tenets of our Catholic faith. He never fails to mention that God may be calling a young boy or girl to the priesthood or religious life.

Recently Bishop Medley visited two of our elementary schools. At one of the schools the Bishop taught about the Lenten liturgical season in which we were currently journeying. He also taught about the meaning behind all of Jesus' choices and actions during this holy season. His goal was to drive home the point that Jesus had laid down His love out of great love for each and every one of us. One of his examples was to ask the students to show him with their hands and arms how much their parents loved them. After the young students showed Bishop Medley with arms outstretched the amount of love their parents had for each of them, he turned to the crucifix and pointed to Jesus and said, "Do you see how Jesus stretched out his arms out of His great love for us?"

On another visit Bishop Medley asked to visit all of the second grade class-rooms as they were just weeks away from making their First Holy Communion. After greeting the students he shared with each class the story of his First Holy Communion. He wrote April 24, 1960 on the board and pulled out the missal and rosary he had received as a young second grader at our Lady of Loretto. He talked about how his second grade teacher at the Catholic school he attended and his pastor, Fr. Spalding, taught him to carry their missal and rosary in their hands as they approached their very first time of receiving the Body of Christ. He shared the importance of the Sacrament of Penance and impressed upon the students how very important those two sacraments were.

Bishop Medley ends his classroom visits a variety of ways. He prays with the students and/or blesses them and asks each class to pray for him. He promises each

Most importantly he conveys to each of those in his care that they are loved by him enough to be remembered with prayer, the celebration of Mass with them and personal visits to their classrooms.





A total of 15 girls and 3 parent volunteers worked for 3 hours sorting through clothing, toys, paperwork, cleaning, and organizing diapers.

Hope Unlimited is an organization that helps women in need of maternal assistance. Whether it be to provide them with basic necessities that may be otherwise difficult to afford such as diapers or shampoo, clothing items or to act as an emergency hotline, Hope Unlimited will help in the Paducah and Metropolis areas.

One of the most important things about Hope Unlimited is that it is Pro Life. The members of SOS chose to do this service project because it stands for what the Catholic Church believes and teaches and that ALL lie is precious. Sisters of Service is an organization of Catholic girls ages 10-18 that is sponsored by the Daughters of Isabella to do good works and service within the community.

This service project, held on January 19, was the first of the 2015 year for the girls of SOS. A total of 226.75 hours were volunteered in 2014. Organizations that the SOS served last year included the West KY Ups and Downs Organization, Special Olympics, St. John's the Evangelist Parish, St. Thomas More Parish, Paducah Power food drive, the Merryman House, Hope Unlimited, Maple Mount Picnic, Daughters of Isabella, and Knights of Columbus Council 1055.

Bruised, Hurting and Dirty

"Kilian"

One spring day Evan and Ellen were out talking to our neighbors in the projects when Evan struck up a conversation with four young boys. The ringleader, 11 vear-old Kilian, looked bored and was casually throwing dirt at the other three as the missionaries walked up.

Evan tried telling the boys some stories about God healing people but Kilian cut in. "I don't believe in God! I hate God. I love the devil!" When this didn't succeed in getting Evan upset, Kilian threw some dirt at him, but that didn't work either. Then, Kilian crossed the line by lobbing some dirt at Ellen.

Evan turned towards Kilian and said, "Please apologize to my sister." While Ellen isn't Evan's sister by blood, they are brother and sister in the family Jesus initiated when he said, "Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother" (Mk 3:35). When the missionaries call each other "brother" and "sister" during mission it often provides a helpful opportunity to explain the family of God to our neighbors.

Sister or not, however, Kilian wasn't apologizing. Instead, he pushed his chest into Evan's and shouted, "What are you going to do? You can't hurt me! I'm just a kid, and you're an adult!"

"I'm not going to hurt you, Kilian," Evan replied, surprised by his anger. "I just want you to apologize." Defiant, Kilian reached out, snatched Evan's pen off his shirt, and stormed off. Thinking Kilian was gone, Evan tried continuing his Bible story to the younger three but all they did was giggle and try to whisper crude jokes to him.

Then Kilian came back and asked for Evan's Bible. Evan said no, and Kilian started circling him and punching him lightly, which Evan ignored as he finished telling the Bible story he'd begun.

Finished with his story, Evan asked Kilian for his pen back, which Kilian surprisingly returned. One of the other boys asked to try on Evan's glasses, which Evan cautiously handed over. Next Kilian wanted a turn, but when he got the glasses, he turned and walked away!

Partially blinded, Evan realized that if he gave chase he would probably never see his glasses again. Instead of reacting, he just kept talking to the other boys, hoping Kilian would come back.

And he did! After a couple tense minutes Kilian wandered back to the group. Evan bent over and let Kilian put

his glasses back on his face. But as he did, Kilian took Evan's pen again, and this time buried it in plain sight under a tree a few yards away.

Ready to leave, Evan asked for his pen back, but Kilian said "I lost it."

-"Do you think you could find it?" asked

- "Maybe," replied Kilian, who promptly unearthed the pen but still refused to give it back.

Evan and Ellen said goodbye and walked back to their car, tired and a little frustrated. As they were getting in, Kilian came running up behind them. "Can you guys come to my house? I live right down the street!" he panted to a stunned Evan and Ellen, giving them his address as well.

Was this the same boy?

Evan made a plan to get back with him as soon as they could. Delighted, Kilian tossed Evan's pen back and sped off.

Two weeks later, Evan's mission

team knocked at Kilian's house. Kilian bounded to the door and let them in. Visibly excited, he quickly cleaned off the sofa and invited them to sit down, parking himself right next to Evan. With a Bible in his lap, Kilian stared straight up at Evan the whole time, drinking it in.

Pope Francis has said, "I prefer a Church that is bruised, hurting and dirty because it has been out on the streets

rather than a Church which is unhealthy from clinging to its own security" (EG 49). I think Evan's decision to quietly endure Kilian's pestering opened Kilian's heart, showing



Recipients of the 2015 John J. McRaith Providing Help Creating Hope Award Named

Catholic Charities of the Owensboro Diocese established the John J. McRaith Providing Help, Creating Hope Award in 2013 to recognize individuals or groups in the Owensboro Diocese who abundantly show the virtue of charity in their work and deeds, aligned with the mission of Catholic Charities.

The award is named after Bishop Emeritus John J. McRaith who retired as bishop of the Owensboro Diocese January 5, 2009.

The winners are:

• Susan Montalvo-Gesser, St Joseph and Paul Parish, Owensboro – Susan, an attorney, holds a legal clinic one Saturday each month for undocumented immigrants in need of legal advice. She sees an average of 8-10 people each month.

•Dirck and Chona Curry, St Stephen Cathedral Parish, Owensboro – Deacon Dirck and Chona Curry minister with St Benedict Homeless Shelter, the Parish Health Group, and RCIA. They recently returned from the Philippines where they worked in mission areas. They also work with the youth group providing food, games, movies and educational support. Deacon Curry chaired the five seasons of the Arise program and is on the Social Concerns Committee. Chona also assists in preparing and serving parish funeral meals.

•Angela Settle, Immaculate Parish, Owensboro—Angela is the current chairperson for the parish St. Vincent de Paul committee. She also helped relocate the new St. Vincent de Paul store and worked some of their events. Angela also organizes the 5 teams who make meals for St. Benedict's Homeless Shelter each month. Angela also provides food for parish bereavement meals.

•Noel and Monty Quinn, Immaculate Conception Parish, Hawesville – This couple started a program called Santa's Sacks helping families in need in the community at Christmas. They recently revived their program with the goal of providing Christmas dinner complete with a turkey to many needy families. They also collaborate with Family Resource Centers and St. Vincent de Paul to provide clothes, toys and food to over 200 needy families in the community.

•Anita Tavano, Sts. Mary and James Parish, Guthrie— Anita started a thrift store called "Second Hand Rose" which provides clothes and home goods through donations. Second Hand Rose also provides assistance with utilities, food and gas. Anita manages the volunteers at Second Hand Rose and collaborates with other entities in the community such as St. Vincent de Paul and Salvation Army. She has a loving and giving spirit.

• Dan Thomas, St. Charles Borromeo Parish, Bardwell – This gentleman plays in the band and drives the bus for the senior citizens, works with prison ministry, works with Hope Center counseling people suffering from addictions and helping them find work. He also works at Martha's Vineyard in the soup kitchen.

• Barbara and Dwayne Fitzhugh, St. John's Parish, Sunfish – This couple worked tirelessly in helping the parish reopen the former St. Vincent de Paul store now called the St. John's Thrift Store. They cleaned, painted, contacted utility companies, recruited workers, and donated items.

•Ray French, St. Ann Parish, Morganfield – This individual is vital to the St. Vincent de Paul Society as he is very involved in food distribution. He is the contact person for the Food Bank in Evansville. He places the orders, picks up the food, organizes the men to unload the truck. He is a Christian witness to the community.

•Scott Elder, St. Agnes Parish, Uniontown - This individual spends much time raising money for cancer victims and their families. He is quick to give credit to the committee of volunteers who help gather donations for fundraisers. This group of volunteers raised \$48,500 for 3 people with cancer. The fundraiser was such a success that another is planned called "Union County gives Back". Scott is also involved in "Childhood Cancer Awareness Month". Scott is also involved in the "Union County Happy Pack Program" which provides food for school children on weekends, and "Ben's Place" an adult care center fundraiser.

•Walter Pudlo, Holy Spirit Parish, Bowling Green- This individual has donated college tuition for newly released prisoners, gives endless hours to St Vincent de Paul, and donates for the needy at Christmas. Walter is always for the 'under dog" and gives generously of his time, talent and treasure.

The following two groups will re-

ceive certificates of merit:

- Hope for Life, Holy Redeemer Parish, Beaver Dam This group offers parenting training, counseling, and supplies to new parents. This program is run by volunteers.
- Fresh Start for Life, St. Mary of the Woods, Whitesville – This group has orchestrated over 50 Encounter Christ retreats for men and women in jails, prisons, and transitional facilities.

Honorable Mention goes to the following:

- Precious Blood Men's Club, Owensboro They have cooked burgoo for Blessed Sacrament picnic at no charge. They also cook to raise money for charitable causes in the community.

Blood Parish, Owensboro – This council adopts a seminarian every year, collect money for the poor, donate money to the parish day care and provide maintenance around the parish.

- Knights of Columbus, St. Henry Parish, Hardin This group regularly help those who cannot afford home repairs. They also assist with housing and moving expenses. They also provide Christmas and Thanksgiving dinners to the needy in Marshall and Trigg counties.
- Susan Clark and Theresa Milliner, St. Joseph Parish, Leitchfield – These women were founding members and have served as officers of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and Holy Trinity conference. They have served with humility, generosity and dedication.

Enhancements & Repairs at St. Joseph's Cemetery Affirm Sacred Trust With Families To Care For Final Resting Places of Loved Ones

LEITCHFIELD, Ky. - Saint Joseph Cemetery, located north of Leitchfield on Brandenburg Road, is the final resting place for members of many long-standing Grayson County families. The cemetery was established shortly after the Civil War. In the 145 years since the first interment, the property has been expanded, brick pillars and a wrought-iron fence were placed along the highway, and various trees and shrubs have been planted along the south and north property lines.

Members of Saint Joseph Catholic Church have renewed past efforts to enhance the parish cemetery in 2015. The Cemetery Committee, chaired by Dick Gatto, hired Carl Tomes of Caneyville to repair the numerous tombstones that have deteriorated over the years. Many of these monuments were the old fashioned, tablet-style made of soft stone leading to breakage as well as erosion of the lettering. Other stones were tilted or falling over due to not having appropriate footers. Mr. Tomes and Cemetery Committee member, Kevin Collard, of Pine View Nursery, and their crews have spent many hours setting aside the monuments in need of repair to allow them to dig deeper foundations and pour new footers. The monument stones are then replaced on the new, stronger footers to hold the stones for generations to come. A new, black, steel six foot tall fence is currently being installed along the south property line to better delineate the cemetery property and provide an attractive backdrop for the plantings which were set last autumn.

Thanks to the efforts of our pastor, Father Tony Bickett, the Cemetery Committee, and the generosity of our current and former parishioners, a Cemetery Fund has been established to help defray the costs of the ongoing repairs and improvements. Costs to purchase a cemetery plot are kept low to allow all the benefit of burial in this sacred place. Individual plots are available for \$400. This cost does not include any perpetual care fees; therefore, the costs to maintain, repair, and enhance the cemetery fall upon family members and parishioners. Many of the earliest individuals buried in Saint Joseph Cemetery no longer have family members attending St. Joseph's Catholic Church or residing in Grayson County.

FULTON, Ky. - No Catholic. No Protestant. No black. No white. No Kentucky. No Tennessee. No imaginary state line. On March 10th, 2015 at St. Edwards Catholic Church here there were only men of God transcending boundaries, preaching in plain spoken terms, calling for spiritual awakening and praying in earnest for peace for the community and the world.

Pastors, representing 6 churches in the twin cities of Fulton, Kentucky and South Fulton, Tennessee, came together to raise their voices and lead approximately 90 people from various congregations in prayer and to summon participates to undergo spiritual awakening.

The community call to action was launched when a humble lady had it laid firmly upon her heart to initiate the gath-

With Father Drury, St. Edwards' Parish Council, and Mary Lou's prayer group solidly supporting her, the gathering was well on its way to be-

coming a reality. Community churches were notified, invitations to participate were extended to area ministers and fliers inviting everyone in the area to attend were posted.

On the evening of March 10th, for 90 minutes the presence of the Lord was felt in the midst of his children and with one voice humble prayers were offered for love, peace, and charity. One community comprised of believers of many denominations raised a collective voice singing universal hymns of healing,

Pastors reminded and encouraged those in attendance to take heed of the teachings found in Colossians 3 "to seek things that are above, where Christ is; and put to death what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire and covetousness."

The clergy beseeched the congregation as in Ephesians 5 to, "Awake, O sleeper, arise from the dead," with the promise that, "Christ will shine on you." The faith community was cautioned to avoid "weapons of mass distraction" such as social media that consume time and energy limiting good works and stunting growth as Christians. The tale of the Good Samaritan was recounted and the congregation was reminded to take action in their neighborhoods and not pass by on the other side of the street to avoid those in trouble.

What began with a voice in the night speaking to a humble woman of God resulted in a community uniting for a a rare glimpse of the Kingdom of God only possible when earthly constraints are abandoned and Christians come together as one people to worship together in hopes of a better world.

Mary Lou Freeman, a St. Edwards' parishioner, explained to those attending the Awakening Service, "One night a warm, strong feeling came over me and I heard a voice. It said get all the churches in the twin cities together and pray for love, peace and charity. So...here we are people!"

Tyler Ward: A Profile in Faith

OWENSBORO, Ky. - Tyler Ward wants to evangelize and lead by example for others to evangelize as well.

Tyler Ward, a senior at Apollo High School, and member of Precious Blood parish is a Catholic high school senior graduating from a public high school.

Tyler attended Holy Angels elementary school in Sorgho until second grade when his parents decided to place him in Sorgho Elementary School, a public school. As Tyler grew up, he became interested in wrestling, a sport not offered in the Catholic Schools at the time.

Being placed in a public school not only offered Tyler some athletic and academic opportunities, but has also become an important stepping stone for him to grow in his Catholic faith.

Although Ward became a member of a public school, his faith could not have been better formed. He was an altar server before he made his First Communion, along with serving as a lector at Mass.

"I come from a large Catholic family which has influenced my faith. My parents pray the rosary with me and support me in my faith," Tyler said. He has found ways as a public school student to share his faith with others: "It isn't always easy being a Catholic student in a public school and having your faith challenged every day, but it makes me a better Catholic."

"I believe that I have an advantage for evangelizing because I don't take my faith for granted or forget what it means to be Catholic, which is easier to do when you are constantly surrounded by your religion," Ward said. "I have enjoyed being a student at Apollo High School and am proud to say that Jacob Fischer, a former student from Apollo, is a seminarian for the Diocese of Owensboro."

Tyler is a part of the St. Mary Magdalene Church youth group which consists of approximately 20 other Apollo High School students. This provides him with a strong community of friends who share his faith as well as attend the same school as he does. Being a member of the youth group involves weekly meetings, fundraisers, retreats, and attending the National Catholic Youth Conference.

These events have allowed a spiritual bond to form among Tyler, his friends, and the Catholic community. The weekly meetings provide a place for teens to talk


about the Catholic faith and worship God. Ward has become even more active in the Catholic Church by participating in fundraisers, such as the annual Precious Blood Church picnic. The Gasper River Catholic Youth Camp and Retreat Center offered a place of spiritual growth for Ward. He was able to establish a spiritual connection with a wider community of people and expand and celebrate his Catholic faith.

Tyler also participates in the annual National Catholic Youth Conference where there are keynote speakers, prayer, mass, and workshops, along with recreational activities. His favorite part about the conference is being able to be a part of a larger Catholic congregation and actively participate in the Catholic faith together. This conference has allowed Ward to share his past experiences with others in the Catholic faith and take away new experiences that strengthen that faith.

Tyler feels that an issue within the Catholic Church is that it should stress evangelization more. He believes this is an important part of the faith that needs to be emphasized and practiced more within Catholicism.

Tyler is doing everything he can to be a disciple of Jesus and to spread His Word, but he feels others need to do the same. Catholicism is a religion with a long history making it more difficult to learn about compared with Protestantism. It is important for the Catholic Church to work closer with its members and teach its members not only to be Disciples of Jesus, but also to instill the Church's history in its members, he feels. This will allow more members to spread and share their faith with others. It is important to remember the struggles Jesus went through to spread Catholicism and attempt to do the same, no matter how difficult.

Tyler Ward, who will be graduating this May, 2015, is an outstanding member of the Catholic community and deserves to be recognized for his involvement with the Church and his desire to spread the word of God. His faith has been challenged by attending a public school, but his life shows that it has only made his faith stronger and allowed him to remember why he is Catholic and what it means to be Catholic. Ward is an inspiration for others to become more involved in the

"Faith isn't something that just happens, it's a journey you have to work at every day," Ward said.

Remembering Father Joe Miller

I first met Fr. Joe Miller in the summer of 1970 just after he came to St. Alphonsus. I was Grand Knight of Council 6101 at Sorgho and as I always did when a new priest came to our area, I invited him to be a member of our K.ofC. council. My daughter was starting school that year and I wanted her to attend St. Alphonsus. Later in the summer I met with Fr. Joe again and ask if I could be a member of his parish. At that time I was a member of St. Raphael's, which was a mission parish of St. Elizabeth at Curdsville. This was worked out and it was the first of many meetings I would have with him.

He was a very friendly person and was a one-man office staff. He did all the paper work and printed the bulletin, as well as paid the teachers.

He had a sharp eye for investments and always seemed to do well with what ever he invested in.

While a member of the Crosier Order he was in charge of theology in the seminary. Bishop Soenneker, then Fr. Soennecker, was director for seminarians at St. Cloud, MN. He would often visit with Fr. Joe and discuss the method of instructions. When Fr. Joe left the Crosier's, for whatever reason he contacted then Bishop Soenneker in Owensboro and ask if he would want him as a pastor. Bishop Soenneker was happy to welcome him to our dioceses.

I spent many evenings with Fr. Joe just visiting and talking about a wide range of subjects. His knowledge of generalities of subjects was quite amazing. A few years later he developed eve problems and then decided to return to Minninosota.

He contacted me again in 2000, and from then on we kept in casual contact from time to time. He was a true servant of the people and their church. He mentioned one time in a conversation, in the winter, he should never have left Kentucky. Cold weather was hard on him. He was a great friend and pastor. May he rest in peace.

El Jubileo se abrirá el 8 de diciembre del 2015, la Solemnidad de la Inmaculada Concepción y cerrará el 20 de noviembre del 2016 con la Solemnidad de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo, Rev del Universo. 


